Residents' Feedback:

Golf Carts Bylaw

Presently, the Traffic Safety Act prohibits the use of golf carts on any roadway in the Province. However, the Minister of Transportation and Economic Corridors passed the [Pilot Project \(Golf Carts\) Regulation](#) that now allows municipalities to pass bylaws to authorize golf cart use on selected highways in the municipality. At the August 16 regular meeting, Council reviewed the first draft of the Pilot Project (Golf Carts) Bylaw and recommended some changes. HEALTH OF GULL LAKE

Addressing Low Water Levels

Everyone around Gull Lake is concerned about declining lake water levels. Water levels have been measured at Gull Lake since 1924 by the Water Service of Canada (WSC). According to a recent [Hydrology Assessment](#), lake water levels have decreased 1.5m from 1924 to 1949; another 1m from 1949 to 1963; and fluctuated +/- 0.5m over the following 60 years. In 2024, lake levels are very low, which is not only a concern for recreational activities, but impinges on the health of the lake.

So, what is being done to address this issue? Presently, there are 3 initiatives that are being undertaken to help stabilize water levels in Gull Lake:

1. Continued Pumping Water from the Blindman River

From 1976 to 2011, the Provincial government granted a water license that allowed water from the Blindman River to be pumped into Gull Lake to stabilize lake water levels. The lake naturally rose above target elevation until 2014 and began declining thereafter, falling below pumping trigger levels in the fall of 2021. In 2016, Prussian Carp, an invasive fish species, was found in Blindman River, and with no system to exclude this fish and eggs, the regulator – Environment and Protected Areas (EPA) – suspended the water licence.

Presently, the Government of Alberta is working with the Gull Lake Watershed Society (GLWS) on a pressurized filter system to potentially exclude Prussian carp and their eggs from the water pumped into Gull Lake.

The GLWS has submitted a preliminary filtration system design to the Province, and if approved, a new water license from the EPA would be granted and pumping from the Blindman River would resume.

2. Pumping Water from the Paskapoo Haynes Aquifer

The engineering firm HCL was commissioned in January 2024 to complete a Gull Lake area [hydrology study of the Paskapoo Haynes](#) aquifer formation. The study objective is to determine the viability and sustainability of pumping deep source fresh water from this aquifer into Gull Lake to stabilize water levels. 3. Gull Lake Regional Master Drainage Feasibility Study

In the past, the natural flow of water from drainage areas to the northwest into Gull Lake has been impeded due to roadway and related developments. An engineering study is needed to examine the feasibility of opening up these drainage areas so that water repositories in these regions may, once again, flow into Gull Lake.

Four municipalities (Ponoka County, Lacombe County, SV of Gull Lake, SV of Parkland Beach) will be applying for an Alberta Community Partnership grant to study the input flow of water into Gull Lake and the feasibility of increasing this flow from these areas.

Lake Water Health Advisories
